

Statistics Canada has released an interesting new article on a study conducted in 2012, entitled, *School mobility and educational outcomes of off-reserve First Nations students*.



Selected school outcomes for off-reserve First Nations students in Grades 1 to 6, Canada, 2012

The study highlights the fact that moving to new locations has a negative influence on the academic performance of First Nations students. This is important to note because, according to the **2012 Aboriginal Peoples Survey (APS)**, more than 70% of off-reserve First Nations students in Grades 1 to 6 had moved schools at least once since starting preschool.



Looking for a way to plan your education or future career? Then Service Canada's **Career Tool** is the resource for you!


With the re-vamping of their Job Bank website, Service Canada has created an innovative way to research jobs and education. The **Career Tool** features the most recent information from Statistics Canada and ESDC's **Canadian Postsecondary Information Collection**. With data from these sources available at your fingertips, you can research:

- which jobs are in demand;
- types of education required to become employed in a specific field;
- wage ranges for different occupations; and
- employment rates of graduates in specific fields of study.

The Career Tool displays information in easy to understand formats such as graphs, pie charts, and percentage breakdowns. Users can search by field of study, occupation, or even location! There is even an option to view information based on education level. Exploring and researching careers is incredibly easy with this unique resource. Already have a degree that you are interested in pursuing? Simply type in your field of study in the search bar, and The Career Tool will do the rest.

Aboriginal Youth Employment and Training Survey

From the beginning of April to the end of May, the Native Women's Association of Canada conducted a survey in order to gauge the experiences of Aboriginal youth when navigating the Canadian job market and seeking employment.

The survey received a surprisingly large response! From across Canada, over 200 Metis, First Nations, and Inuit between the ages of 18 and 30 told us what they thought. While the majority of the respondents were female, we still had a number of male respondents completing the survey.

We found that many of the respondents were highly educated, with over 22% having completed some university courses, and 24% already graduated. Another 17% indicated that they had completed their Master's degree.

The results are still in the process of being fully analyzed and rolled into a report. This report will be made available on the NWAC website, so stay tuned!
